"Have to" vs "Must"

Compare and explain the difference...

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Must vs. Have to (Englishclub.com)

- Must is a modal auxiliary verb.
- Structure: Subject + must + main verb
- Example: I must sleep.
 - *I must to sleep.
- Have to is a main verb.
- Structure: Subject + have + to infinitive
- Example: I have to read this this textbook for school.

What is the difference?

- Must I use Google Slides to present this information?
- Do I have to use Google Slides to present this information?

Must and Have to

- They are both used "to express obligation or necessity" (gymglish.com)
- Must is more appropriate in the context of personal "<u>feelings</u>". What does the speaker believe they are obliged to do?
- Have to is more appropriate in the context of "impersonal ideas" (such as <u>rules</u>). What is the speaker obliged to do for/by an external agent?
- Example: "Must I wear a tie?" vs. "Do I have to wear a tie?"

What is the difference?

- Must I use Google Slides to present this information?
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Must vs. Have to "obligations"

- **Must is subjective** (i.e. the opinion, idea, or "internal feeling" of the subject/speaker).
- Describes what the subject thinks they are obliged to do.
- Example: I must eat more lean meat.
- Have to is objective (i.e. imposed by an external force/object)
- Describes what the subject is obliged to do by something external.
- Example: I have to cook the chicken to 160°F.

Have to or Must?

"Have to" vs. "Must"

- Have to inflects for all tenses (i.e. has, had, will have, etc.)
- Must does not inflect and can only be used to discuss the present or future.

- I must do some yoga now.
- I must do some yoga after class today.
- *I must did some yoga before work.
- I had to do some yoga before class started.

Negation Contexts

- **Have to:** Negation requires a preceding auxiliary verb:
- Ex. Foreign students <u>do not</u> have to take "American" names.
- Must: Negation when followed by not (or n't contraction).
- Ex. Foreign students must not (or musn't) take "American" names.

"Have to" structure does not lend itself to <u>prohibiting</u> an action. <u>Prohibitions</u> use "must".

- Passengers must not smoke. * Passengers do not have to smoke.
- I mustn't forget my anniversary this year.

Final thoughts on **must** and **have to...**


 Negations of these forms cannot be used to express past tense, so other grammatical structures must be used:

Teachers **must not** include final exam grades when calculating final averages this year.

Teachers **could not** include final exam grades when calculating final averages last year.

- Conversational/Informal Alternative: have got to "gotta"
- I gotta update my computer.
